Students of history, international relations, governance or policy making will find this course a fascinating and resume-building experience.

LOCATION

The former Soviet republics are multiethnic, multilingual, multiconfessional states which have struggled to form effective governance policies. The dramatic experience of these governments can and should inform the decisions of future diplomats and domestic policymakers in the world's increasingly multicultural societies.

PC-391: CONFLICT AND POLICY

This course introduces the general theories of conflict and conflict resolution. It then focuses on a select number of specific case studies in the Post-Soviet Space (PSS). These include events in Central Asia, the Caucasus, Kosovo, Ukraine, Moldova, and Georgia. Links between state policy and conflict, conflict resolution and prevention, international terrorism, and processes of integration and disintegration are discussed. The roles of religion, media, language, international influences, ethnicity, and more are covered by guest speakers. Students produce several policy papers as part of the course.

PC-391L: MULTICULTURAL LAB


Related educational excursions, international travel, roundtables with local university students, and hands-on cultural events will further educate students in the modern cultures and peoples covered in this course.
